Statement on Archival Language:

The David Allan Hubbard Library aims to describe archival materials in a way that is respectful to all communities who use, create, and are represented in our collections. However, the nature of historical materials is such that some material may represent positions, language, values, and stereotypes that are not consistent with the current values and practices at Fuller Theological Seminary.

Within our finding aids, it is possible users may encounter language that is offensive or harmful. While some language included in finding aids was written by staff, other language originates from the people and organizations that created the material. For example, folder titles are often preserved from the creators. It is standard practice not to change them and, in some cases, it provides important context about the materials. When we find problematic language created by archivists and staff we strive to update it. When we find problematic language from the original creator we will transcribe as is to preserve the context of its creation.

Biographical History

H. Newton Malony (1931 - 2020) was an active faculty member of Fuller Theological Seminary since joining the School of Psychology in 1969. He earned an AB from Birmingham Southern College, an MDiv from Yale Divinity School; and MA and PhD from George Peabody College. He became Professor of Emeritus of Psychology at Fuller Theological Seminary.

H. Newton Malony was a “Travis boy,” hired by the School of Psychology’s founding dean Lee Edward Travis. The appointment of Malony and his colleagues supplied the requisite professors needed for the school’s accreditation.

For 46 years, Malony aimed to instruct students regarding theological and psychological “integration at the level of principles, of profession, and of person, the 3Ps.” Malony’s passion proved highly instrumental in the development and stability of the School of Psychology, a strong example as it continues to integrate Christian faith with clinical practice.

A prodigious scholar, Malony's publications include *Living with Paradox: Religious Leadership and the Genius of Double Vision* (1998) and *Christ in the Heart of Psychology: The Early Years of Fuller Seminary's School of Psychology* (1996). A licensed psychologist and ordained United Methodist minister, Malony also maintained professional involvement in the American Psychological Association, California Psychological Association, Society for the Scientific Study of Religion, and American College of Forensic Examiners.

Scope and Content

The Papers of H. Newton Malony contains documents related to the history of Fuller Theological Seminary’s School of Psychology, particularly its foundation and direction within the early years. The collection also focuses on Malony’s articles and long writing projects. Malony’s research expertise included the fields of transactional analysis, clinical psychology, psychology of religion, integration of psychology and theology, religious tolerance, human sexuality, and gender identity. Additional A/V materials include VHS tapes and a lecture series on “Parenthood” on audiocassette tape.
