"To be allowed {to} employ people to sell on the streets and at gatherings during the Lindbergh reception The Lindbergh Song composed by me. A copy herewith attached.

I am a resident of San Diego, an old time Minstrel Comedian, 68 years old.

I did my bit during the World's War and my services as a performer have always been tendered gratis for all benefit occasions.

Thanking you for your consideration.

Attached newspaper clipping of his song lyrics headed by signed photograph of Lindbergh and the Spirit of St. Louis:

Photograph of Lindbergh's face smiling in the middle of the globe and graphic. Message reads "Col. Chas. Lindbergh...Welcome to San Diego!" Copyright 1927 mark.

Accompanied by Petition of B. Stahl and N. or Wm or W. Paris, et al., to the Common Council, City of San Diego, dated September 15, 1927:

"That we be granted a free permit for ourselves and six assistants to sell windshield stickers similar to the attached, during the next ten days. These stickers are made in San Diego and petitioners are ex-service men.

7. September 17, 1927 Petition of Common Council, City of San Diego, for a Free Permit to sell miniature Ryan airplanes by George J. Lynch:

"Permission is requested to sell miniature {sic} Ryan airplanes to be attatched (sic) to the radiator caps of autos, sample herewith (missing). Am a resident and property owner in San Diego living at 3641 31st St. and a vetern (sic) of the late war.

These to be sold at the flying field and entrance to the stadium, from an auto, and none but local residents, and ex-service men will sell them. A free permit is requested.
