Among other things, clerics are to "preache & teache the worde of God merelie sincerelie and purelie wtout coler or paynting according to the trew meanyng & intent of the texte" & neither religious men nor secular priests are to "haunte ne use comen tavernes nor ale houses nor goo alone suspiciously either in citie towne or village".
